According to the U.S. Department of Education, "The College Scorecard provides students and families with clear information through an interactive tool that lets them choose among any number of options based on their individual needs—including location, size, campus setting, and degree and major programs. Each Scorecard includes five key pieces of data about a college: costs, graduation rate, loan default rate, average amount borrowed, and employment. These data will be updated periodically, and the Department plans to publish information on earnings potential in the coming year." The IACAC Government Relations Committee (GRC) is hosting a panel discussion on the College Scorecard which will include members of NACAC's Government Relations Committee as well as college representatives in order to share their insights on the benefits and drawbacks of this federal initiative.
