The Honors Program is available to new freshman and transfer students. Honors freshman criteria for consideration is the upper 10% of the high school graduating class or a 3.5 cumulative unweighted GPA on a 4.0 scale and an ACT composite of 26 or higher. Transfer students with a minimum GPA of 3.50 will be considered for the Honors Program.

Admissions Requirements

Freshmen

Applicants will be considered for admission based on high school and college preparatory coursework, cumulative unweighted GPA, grade trends, and ACT or SAT scores. Although optional, a personal statement and letters of recommendation are carefully considered in the holistic admission review process.

Foreign language is not an entrance requirement; however, EIU does require one year in a single foreign language for graduation. Students with two years of a single foreign language in high school with a "C" average will be considered to have met this requirement.

GPA of 2.5/4.0 with 24 or more college-level semester hours. GPA of 2.0/4.0 with 30 or more college-level semester hours. GPA of 2.0/4.0 at most recent school of attendance. Students with less than above semester hours must also meet freshman criteria.

Governors State University (GSU) offers majors and courses to students at all levels, from beginning undergraduate through doctoral programs. GSU is also committed to serving community college graduates, transfer students, returning adult and commuting students as they pursue their education and career goals.

Students have several options for pursuing a bachelor's degree at GSU. They can apply to begin their degree program as a freshman, transfer to GSU after completing coursework at another institution, continue their education at GSU after a delay, or enroll in the Dual Degree Program. The Dual Degree Program enables students enrolled full time in one of GSU's 17 partner community colleges to complete their associate degree and enroll at GSU to complete their bachelor's degree.

GSU offers 34 bachelor's degree programs, with associated majors and minors, in liberal arts, sciences, education, business, and health sciences; 29 master's degree and 5 doctoral degree programs

AP Credit

GSU awards college credit for Advanced Placement (AP) exams with scores of three (3) or higher depending on the exam.

Transfers

For academic year 2016-2017, a minimum of 25 semester or 37.5 quarter hours with a minimum GPA of 2.0 or an AA or AS degree from a regionally accredited institution and good standing at the last institution attended are required. Students not meeting the above criteria may petition for admission under certain circumstances. Specific majors have established selective criteria above the university minimum. Refer to the Governors State University Catalog for specific major criteria. GSU has rolling admission for most undergraduate programs. However, specific deadline dates for the fall, spring and summer semesters are published in the GSU Catalog.

Founded in 1857, Illinois State University was the first public university in the state and is one of the Midwest's oldest institutions of higher education. It is a coeducational, residential university with an emphasis on undergraduate study. The campus is located in the twin-city community of Bloomington-Normal near the geographic center of the state, 137 miles southwest of Chicago and 164 miles northeast of St. Louis.

In making admission decisions, Illinois State considers the following self-reported information:

- · Grade point average
- · ACT/SAT scores (writing exam not required)
- · Academic personal statement (optional) addressing:
- · Why Illinois State is a good fit for student's educational goals.
- · Student's academic strengths and weaknesses.
- Circumstances which affected student's high school academic performance (if applicable).

Applicants must also show successful completion of the following:

- English 4 years
- Mathematics 3 years including Algebra, Geometry, Algebra II (while not required, four years is encouraged)
- Natural Science 2 years with laboratories
- · Social Science 2 years
- Foreign language/fine arts 2 years of the same foreign language or 2 years of fine arts
- Electives 2 years

Our preferred filing date for applications and required documents is September 1 - November 15.

Of the freshmen admitted for the 2015-2016 academic year, half earned ACT composite scores of 21-26 (1060-1270 on new SAT). A quarter of the admitted students scored 27 or above, and another quarter scored between 18 and 20. The average high school grade point average of freshmen admitted was 3.37/4.0.

Illinois State considers the following in making admission decisions:

The Admission Decision Score is calculated using the following formula: (ACT composite) (10) + (high school GPA) (200) = Admission Decision Score

> Example: ACT composite 18 and GPA 2.80 18 (10) + 2.8 (200) 180 + 560 = 740

Applicants who have taken the SAT can use our conversion table found at www.neiu.edu/SAT to determine the equivalent ACT score.

Applicants with an Admission Decision Score of 649 (or higher) will be granted admission. Those with an Admission Decision Score between 550 and 648 will be granted conditional admission through our Success Programs, Applicants admitted conditionally are required to participate in one of the academic success programs which include: Project Success, Proyecto Pa'Lante, El Centro and CCIS. High School subject requirements

- 4 Years of English
- 3 Years of Social Science Courses
- · 3 Years of Mathematics (including computer programming)
- 3 Years of Natural Science Courses
- 2 Years of Foreign Languages, Fine Arts, Music, Art or Vocational Education (only one vocational education course accepted)

If students meet the admissions requirement but are deficient in any of the subject areas, they may still be eligible for admission.

Must have an overall GPA of 2.0 and good standing at the last college attended full-time.

Students with fewer than 24 semester hours must also meet freshman admissions requirements.

Application Deadlines:

Completed application, high school or college transcripts and ACT/SAT score for freshman applicants for fall 2017 must be on file in the Admissions Office by July 15, 2017.

The University of Illinois Springfield is one of three campuses of the University of Illinois. Today, the more than 5,000 students enrolled are a mix of traditional residential students and full- and part-time non-traditional students - those who have transferred to UIS from other institutions; returned to finish a degree; or who are seeking advanced degrees, second degrees, or professional programs. In October 1999, UIS reached a milestone in its history when the Illinois Board of Higher Education unanimously approved the campus' four -year baccalaureate program, Capital Scholars. This program enrolled its first class of freshmen in Fall 2001. UIS admitted its first class of general admission freshman in addition to Capital Scholars Honors Freshman group starting Fall 2006. Students can pursue any of 43 University of Illinois degree programs, including 24 bachelor's degree programs. The average class is 15, with a student/faculty ratio of 15:1.

Major academic factors considered in admission decisions are: (1) high school college preparatory coursework (2) class rank (3) cumulative grade-point average (4) ACT or SAT scores (5) personal and academic statement.

Transfers

Applicants holding an Associate in Arts, Associate in Science, or Associate in Arts and Sciences from an Illinois regionally accredited college or university are admissible as juniors.

Other applicants: Applicants with 30 or more semester hours and a cumulative grade-point average of 2.00 or higher on a 4.00 scale from any accredited institution of higher education who do not hold an associate degree may be admitted. Applicants who have college coursework but fewer than 30 hours must meet freshman admission requirements. UIS is a participant in the Illinois Articulation Initiative (IAI), a statewide agreement that allows transfer of the completed Illinois General Education Core Curriculum between participating institutions.

Freshmen

WIU is committed to admitting students whose academic records indicate a high potential for success. The University primarily considers ACT/SAT scores and high school GPA in the admissions decision.

Profile of the Freshmen Class for Fall 2015 (middle 50%)

ACT Composite Score 18 – 23 High School GPA 2.57 – 3.48

Applicants whose ACT/SAT score or high school GPA falls below the middle 50% range of this profile are encouraged to submit a personal statement which addresses their academic goals and how they plan to realize those goals at WIU. Letters of support from the high school guidance counselor will also be strongly considered.

Applicants whose ACT/SAT score or high school GPA falls below the middle 50% of the freshmen profile may be admitted regularly or into the Academic Services Program (alternative admission program). To guarantee consideration for admission as an incoming freshman through the Academic Services Program, applicants should submit an application and supporting materials by December 1, 2016.

Applicants who submit their application and all supporting materials prior to December 1 will be given preferred consideration. Space is limited for admissions and the deadline to apply for Fall is August 1, 2017.

Students may be admitted to Western Illinois University – Quad Cities Freshmen Honors cohort if they have at least an ACT composite score of 20 and a high school GPA of 3.0.

Transfer

Applicants who have earned 24 or more semester hours of college work will be considered for admission on the basis of college performance only. College work must have at least a combined "C" average for all hours attempted from all institutions and be in good standing at the last college/university attended.

Applicants to who have earned fewer than 24 semester hours must meet freshmen admission standards, have at least a combined "C" average for all hours attempted from all institutions, and be in good standing at the last college/university attended.

Honor College Eligibility

For entering freshmen, must fall into one of the following categories: 28 ACT composite or higher (SAT equivalent 1260) 26 or 27 ACT composite & top 15% of graduating class (SAT 1190 or 1220) 24 or 25 ACT composite & top 10% of graduating class (SAT 1110 or 1150)
