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University of St. Francis to host Sharing the Dream Conference High school, college counselors learn how to support undocumented students

JOLIET –High school and college professionals from throughout the state will come to the University of St. Francis (USF) on Wednesday, May 20 to learn how to support undocumented students.

The first Sharing the Dream Conference is expected to draw more than 350 attendees, according to Eric Ruiz, associate director of Admissions at USF, and one of the conference organizers.

"Undocumented students face many issues as they attempt to achieve the dream of a college education," noted Ruiz. "There are substantial gaps in information and many barriers such as limited financial aid. Our hope for this conference is that everyone walks away knowing that there are resources for students."

Support for undocumented students continues to grow, said Ruiz, who noted that the State of Illinois is addressing the issue with House of Representatives Bill 3528 that that allows these students to eligible for state college financial assistance.

Recognized as one of the nation's leading experts on undocumented immigrant youth and young adults, Roberto Gonzalez, assistant professor of Education in the Graduate School of Education at Harvard University, will give a keynote address. During the past decade he has studied undocumented immigrant children as they transition to adolescence and young adulthood. His "West Coast Undocumented Young Adults Research Project in Los Angeles and Seattle" collected information on more than 300 undocumented young adults who have lived in the United States since childhood. This research has helped provide a better understanding of these students educational trajectories, how they come of age and how they engage in civic and political activity.

Gonzalez is engaged in two projects aimed at better understanding the effects of the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program. He is also working on a comparative study of immigrant youth of the United States and the United Kingdom.

The Sharing the Dream conference program will include a panel of "dreamer" students sharing their experiences. Break out educational sessions will include Understanding the Issues; How to Be an Effective Ally for Undocumented College and for High School Students; Parents as Allies in Pursuit of the Dream; and Paying for College.
