Access to education for undocumented students is an important social justice issue facing the 21st century and we all have the opportunity to lead this effort together.

As you go through the sessions we invite you to engage others and exchange ideas. We thank you for joining us today and for your continued investment in the future of our student's lives. We are glad to have you join us as we attempt to craft inclusive communities that foster support and breed a movement: a movement by which all students may benefit from sharing the dream.
